# Ian's Do's and Don'ts

**DO** – Wipe off condensation from windows when you wake up in the morning and open your windows for 10 minutes to air your home. Keeping this area dry and removing water from the silicone edges will help to prevent damp and mould.

**DON'T** – Use toilet bowl rim hangers, these can detach and block the main soil pipe and when empty cause staining in the pan. Try to use bleach or bottled toilet cleaner instead.

**REMEMBER** – Before I visit clean and tidy the area where the work is needed and, if you are happy with the work I have done leave me a review on Google.

# Helpful Information from our Housing Support Officer

Are you coming up to pension age? If you are turning 66 this year you should have received a letter inviting you to claim your state pension. The invitation can arrive up to 4 months before your birthday and asks you to apply online. If you haven't received this invitation or have misplaced it please contact HMRC directly on 0800 731 0469. If you have this letter and need help completing your application I can assist you and check that you are claiming all benefits you are entitled to.

There is so much support out there and unclaimed benefits that can really make a difference to peoples lives. If you require assistance or help to access household support call me on 01902 552 780 to make an appointment.

#### Cost of Living Support 2023 / 2024


The UK Government has announced that cost of living payments will continue and will be paid automatically. The approximate timeline for payments to be issued across 2023-2024 will be:

- Low-income cost of living payment will be £900 paid to those on means-tested benefits. Payments will be paid in three instalments. £301 in Spring 2023, £300 in Autumn 2023, and £299 paid in Spring 2024
- Pensioner cost of living payment will be £300 to be paid in the Winter 2023/24, this will be paid to those in receipt of Winter Fuel Payment (WFP) and likely to be paid with the WFP or around the same time.
- Disability cost of living payment will be £150 for those in receipt of a non-means tested disability benefit. This will be paid in between 20th June and 4th July 2023. (AA, DLA, PIP, AFIP, WPMS)

## TIME TO TACKLE THE GARDEN?

Suzanne and Heather from Public Protection are providing some handy tips on safety in the garden and on the best ways to dispose of garden waste.

- Lock garden tools away in a shed or other secure area, and never leave electrical equipment plugged in when not in use
- Keep chemicals such as weed killer and fertiliser out of reach of young children, and always keep them in their original containers never be tempted to transfer them to food jars or drinks bottles



- Drowning Babies and toddlers can drown in as little as 5cm of water, so supervision around ponds is essential
- Also think about neighbours' gardens. Young children can wander off into them and drown in garden ponds
- Check plant labels for toxicity warnings
- Use gloves when pruning or weeding and keep skin covered
- Keep a watchful eye on children and pets when playing near growing plants
- Keep uprooted plants and pruning cuttings out of each of children and pets


REMEMBER: If you are thinking of sprucing up your garden, please be aware that anyone you engage to remove the waste for you is legally required to have a Waste Carriers Licence. You should request that they provide you with a receipt for the type of waste, details of where the waste will be disposed of and details of their Waste Carriers Licence. # Celebrating Windrush 75

HMT Empire Windrush arrived at Tilbury docks on 22nd June 1948, bringing more than 800 passengers from the Caribbean shaping modern Britain.



Britain was a different place in 1948, the Second World War had just ended, thousands of homes and buildings had been destroyed and needed to rebuilt. In the Caribbean some of the men and women who had served in the British forces answered an advert asking them to come to Britain with the promise of jobs, others were just curious wanting to see a country they had heard so much about. Upon arrival many found difficulty in being offered the jobs they had been promised facing racism, adversity and discrimination. Black people had to stick together and support one another.

More people and families would follow with over half a million migrants arriving in Britain from 1948 to the late 60's. Lots of those who came to Britain with their parents faced deportation in 2017. Despite living in Britain legally tougher immigration rules brought in by Teresa May, the then Home Secretary meant those who had travelled with their parents were no longer legal citizens, despite living and working here for the majority of their lives.

There has since been u-turn on the Home Office rules with an apology and support from MP's that things will be put right. During Black History Month we brought you the story of **Paulette Wilson** (20 March 1956 – 23 July 2020) a British immigrant rights activist who fought her own deportation to Jamaica and brought media attention to the human rights violations of the Windrush scandal. Paulette delivered a petition to Downing Street calling on the UK Government to deliver justice to those affected by the scandal.



Paulette was arrested twice and wrongfully detained narrowly missing deportation ahead of a flight to Kingston due to an intervention by her then MP Emma Reynolds and the Refugee Migrant Centre in Wolverhampton. Paulette was described by her daughter and granddaughter as 'a widely loved and respected lady with an infectious laugh and loved by all.

This year marks the 75th anniversary of the Windrush and we want to share with you the celebrations happening in the city to mark this momentous occasion. We hope that this June you can join in the celebrations and take part in one of the many events across the city.



### **Become a StreetWatch Volunteer**

StreetWatch groups are made up of volunteers from local communities. They carry out street patrols, but have no police powers. Streetwatch is about local residents promoting good citizenship and supporting a better neighbourhood by patrolling their own streets. They provide visible reassurance and appropriately engage in local issues that matter most to your community.

The groups are managed by a coordinator, who is part of the group. Their job includes:

- keeping a volunteer list
- providing advice, guidance and support
- regularly speaking with the local policing team ٠

Groups patrol in a minimum group of two and register them on a forum. The local policing team also look at the forum before the patrols take place, to know where the group is going.

As a Street Watch member, you will patrol your local area for at least two hours every month, at times which suit you. You will patrol in a minimum of two members, talk to people you meet and encourage them to take an active interest in keeping your area safe. So your neighbours know what you are there for, you will wear a high visibility street watch jacket. Your local street watch co-ordinator will give you day to day support, so you know what to look out for and you will also have support from your local police. It is a programme that has worked elsewhere in the country and is now established in the west midlands.

If the group sees suspicious activity, they report it to the policing team, but do not get involved. If you want to find out more about StreetWatch, please contact the Fallings Park, Bushbury, Low Hill and Oxley policing team by email bushbury@westmidlands.police.uk
